**4. The officer must understand the fundamental concepts and be familiar with the basic functional areas of military justice litigation within the DON and the DoD including:**

**a. ESR-1: Criminal procedure**

**(1) Pre-Trial:** The role of law enforcement, providing advice to law enforcement, proper methods of obtaining evidence and interviewing witnesses, rules and procedures related to convening criminal courts, pre-trial restraint and hearings, preliminary hearings, plea agreements and discovery rules.

**(2) Trial:** The parts of a trial, motions practice, pleas, *voir dire* and empanelment, findings and instructions.

**(3) Post-Trial:** Collateral consequences of litigation, the post-trial process, the appellate process and clemency.

**b. ESR-2: Criminal Law.** Criminal offenses and defenses and the exercise of prosecutorial discretion including charging decisions like alternative charging and lesser-included offenses.

**c. ESR-3: Rules of evidence and witness testimony.** Laying foundations, introducing real and demonstrative evidence, the use of experts and the rules governing direct examination and cross-examination.

**d. ESR-4: Principles of sentencing.** Use of evidence in aggravation, extenuation and mitigation, forms of punishments and the maximum punishments, proper sentencing arguments, sentencing instructions and voting procedures.

**e. ESR-5: Due process protections and adverse administrative processes.**

**f. ESR-6: Ethics.** Must be able to analyze and apply the principles of ethical decision making, including the standards of professional ethical behavior and exemplary conduct.

**g. ESR-7: Ability to communicate in writing.** Research and writing skills which cogently and creatively present a legal position while interweaving theme and theory.

h. ESR-8: Ability to orally articulate complex ideas to a variety of audiences, and interpret the non-verbal cues exhibited by clients, witnesses, potential members and other counsel, including the ability to use non-verbal communication concepts to evaluate *voir dire* and testimony.
