- Combined lethality: Developing Allies & Partners with the capability, capacity and will to conduct operations aligned with U.S. objectives.



- 3) Strategic Planners: Navy, Joint, or Inter-Agency Strategy, Plans & Policy






FAO Life of Service Connecting the Strategic to the Tactical



Billets by Line of Work







FAO Training Pipeline

- A fully-qualified FAO has met the following criteria:
 - Regionally-focused POL/MIL Master's degree
 - Language proficiency in a major language of assigned region at a minimum level of 2, in 2 of 3 modalities (Listening, Reading and Speaking)
 - In-theater duty experience of 1 year in the region of specialty
- Upon transfer to the FAO community, training track will be designed in order to complete graduate education and language proficiency qualification requirements
 - Graduate education: Naval Postgraduate School, Naval War College, Foreign War College
 - Language training: Defense Language Institute
 - Regional experience: In-region FAO assignment

A fully qualified FAO draws on operational expertise combined with advanced language, regional experience, and cultural skills in support of U.S. maritime interests



Bonus Pays

- As career linguists, FAOs receive Foreign Language Proficiency
 Bonus pay based on language proficiency
 - Stepped increases based on proficiency level, up to \$1000 per month.
 - Requires annual testing to maintain pay
- FAOs are eligible for Sea Pay, Hazardous Duty Incentive Pay, Imminent Danger Pay, etc. depending on posting
- Authorized Hazardous Duty Incentive Pay for Aviation Qualified FAOs while in a flying attaché billet
- Additional Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) and tax-free status depending on posting



Naval Aviation Qualified FAO (AFAO)

"Develop a program similar to the Aeromedical Dual Designator Program, which will enable the Navy to safely utilize its cadre of FAOs previously designated as aviators, and leverage the unique [LREC] skills that these officers bring to the DAS."

Secretary of the Navy, 28 Oct 2013

- Policy
 - Previously designated <u>1310s ONLY</u>
 - 1710 Designator + FFQ Additional Qualification Designator = AFAO
 - Aeronautically Designated Personnel per NATOPS
- Billets
 - > AFAOs fill 5 of the 13 Navy flying attaché billets
- Personnel
 - > ~ 60 AFAOs



How to Join: Lateral Transfer

- Two lateral transfer boards a year: August and February
 - NAVADMIN released every year in November
 - Applications due approximately 60 days prior to board
 - Requirements
 - 4 YCS, warfare qualification, 110 DLAB, 2.60 GPA, overseas screening for member and dependents to NSA Bahrain standards, TS-SCI eligible
 - FAO panel interview: Scheduled by OCM after application received

SWO to FAO Tailored Community Transition

- June: SWO DH board, results released in late June/early July
- July: DH-selects notified by SWO OCM of opportunity to apply for TCT
- October: Deadline to apply for FAO TCT to FAO OCM
- October November: FAO TCT Interviews
- December: Selects notified

Post-selection region assignments

- Member preferences
- Community need (by year group and community-wide)
- Career timing: path to qualification and competitive for future promotion
