# BLUF

NAVADMIN 070/25 announces the U.S. Naval War College (NWC) Fleet Seminar Program (FSP) for academic year 2025-2026. FSP offers intermediate level Joint Professional Military Education (JPME-I) through a set of three courses; each normally require one academic year to complete and runs from September 2025 through May 2026. There is no tuition fee and course materials are provided on a loan basis at no cost to the students. All applications for FSP must be submitted by 31 May 2025. Please see NAVADMIN and QR for further information.

Who needs to know? All Officers, Training Officers, Executive Officers, and Commanding Officers.

## What you need to know - key points

- FSP is comprised of three courses: Strategy and War (S&W), Theater Security Decision Making (TSDM), and Joint Maritime Operations (JMO). Each course takes approximately 34 weeks to complete.
- Completion of all three courses results in the award of a College of Naval Command & Staff diploma and credit for JPME-I.
- FSP is the only NWC College of Distance Education (CDE) Program that offers a path to a NWC master's degree through the Graduate Degree Program (GDP).
- NWC accepts applications from commissioned officers (active & reserve) and civilian employees of the federal government.
- Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard O-3 and above, other service officers O-4 and above, and civilian employees in the grade of GS-11 and above (or equivalent) are eligible to enroll. Limited Duty Officers O-3 and above are encouraged to apply.
- All applicants must have earned a minimum of a bachelor's degree.
- Seminars meet once a week in the evening and will be offered in the following 15 locations for the 2025-2026 academic year:

# FAQ

## Q. What is the difference between FSP and the NWC Online Program?

A. While both programs satisfy the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff JPME-I requirement, only FSP courses are accredited by the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE) for the NWC master's degree. The Online Program courses are delivered asynchronously and FSP courses are delivered synchronously, at night, mostly in-person but occasionally virtual.

#### Q. What are the classes like?

A. Classes are comprised of Socratic seminar discussion and some presentations. Required work is essays and some group projects. Overall participation in the class is considered a graded event for each course. Courses may be taken in any order.

#### Q. Three years is a long time to commit, can I complete the program quicker?

A. Yes. A student may request to enroll in two courses (dual enrollment) in their second year but must have a grade of B or higher in the first course. Please note that the academic workload is very demanding for dual enrolled students.

## Q. How long do I have to complete the program once I'm accepted?

A. You can take as long as necessary to complete the program for JPME-I credit and the NWC Naval Command & Staff diploma. All coursework for the NWC master's degree must be completed within a 7-year period.

## Q. Can I mix and match NWC education programs for JMPE-I credit?

A. Yes. A student may start with one program and finish with another to earn JPME-I (e.g. start TSDM with FSP then transfer to the Online Program and finish remaining modules). Visit the NWC website to see the latest credit for prior coursework. Please note, the GDP will only accept fully completed FSP courses taken within 7 years for the master's degree. GDP requires the 9 remaining elective credits to be taken with another regionally accredited university or with available NWC elective courses.
